Agency Highlight

Public Department of Public Health and Environment: Gabby Stapleton

Overview

- **Program Name**: Healthy Beverages for All
- **Goal**: Reduce excessive sugary drink consumption among children, particularly in Pueblo, CO, to prevent chronic diseases like diabetes and cavities.

Main Initiative

- **Policy Proposal**: "Healthy Drinks in Kids' Meals" a proposed city ordinance.
 - Change: Make the default drink in kids' meals water or unsweetened milk (not sugary drinks).
 - Important: Kids/families can still order other drinks, but the healthy option is the default.

Current Status

- The initiative is part of a **3-year statewide grant project**, now in **Year 2**.
- Seven counties are involved, some working on similar policies or soda taxes.

Community Engagement

- Created and promoted the "Drink to Grow" survey to assess public support.
 - o **Result**: 81% of 321 respondents support a healthy default drink policy in Pueblo.
- Community outreach efforts include:
 - Toddler story time booths at libraries
 - o Presentations to healthcare and early childhood organizations
 - o Direct outreach to restaurants

Data Highlights

- 2021: 23.6% of children aged 1–14 in Pueblo consumed sugary drinks daily (vs. 15% statewide).
- **2023**: That number rose sharply to **70%**, showing urgent need for intervention.

Support & Implementation

- Asking for community support:
 - Agencies like the Early Childhood Council are asked to sign a letter of support (non-binding).
 - Support includes use of logos on outreach materials.
- Restaurant Incentives:
 - Voluntary participation is encouraged.
 - o Financial incentives are offered to cover menu changes.
- Pushback:
 - Not from soda companies, but from restaurants hesitant about offering milk due to cost/spoilage.

Other Notes

- Outreach to schools isn't part of the current scope (restaurants only), but feedback is welcomed.
- Latino Chamber of Commerce is tentatively supportive; efforts to connect with the Greater Chamber continue.
- Past initiatives like "Steps to a Healthier Pueblo" were mentioned as similar efforts focused on schools.

New Business

Matt Guy

1. Parent Survey Update

- A community **parent survey** was previously conducted.
- Some data had to be cleaned ("scrubbed"), but the revised **analysis is complete**.
- The **Coalition** will present findings at the **May Council meeting**, alongside annual **provider survey** results for comparison.
- Expect a mix of surprising and unsurprising insights.

SECC Update

2. Kids Count Day at the Capitol

- Several members attended **Kids Count Day** at the Colorado Capitol.
- Unfortunately, **many legislators were unavailable** due to the introduction of the **state budget** and heavy bill activity ("Obamathon").
- However, they had a **productive meeting with the Colorado Children's Campaign**, which is interested in doing more **local work** in Pueblo.

3. Book Review Project

- The team is reviewing a book titled **Parenting is Hard** by **Ashley Manson**, encountered at the Rocky Mountain Early Childhood Conference.
- The book focuses on **non-traditional caregivers**.
- The group is **not endorsing** it yet—just offering **feedback** to help shape future versions.

4. Outreach in New Mexico

- They're attempting to contact:
 - A New Mexico parent coalition (statewide group)
 - A Los Alamos foundation that supports grandparents and older caregivers
- Progress has been slow due to **unresponsive contacts**, but outreach efforts are ongoing.

Angie Shehorn-Children First

1. Enrollment & Matching Challenges

- UPK enrollment is not progressing smoothly.
- Many families are still unmatched and in limbo.
- Programs with vacant seats are encouraged to reach out there's a significant list of families needing placement.
- **District 60** changes are impacting placements:
 - o Reduced from **24 hours/week to 10 hours/week**, split into AM/PM half-day sessions.
 - Half of their preschool classrooms will close next year, reducing available seats.
 - As a result, many families are looking for new options.

2. District Options

- **District 70** is now offering **4 full-day sites** (30 hours/week) and accepting families from **outside their boundaries**.
- **District 60** continues to serve both 3- and 4-year-olds:
 - 155 max slots for 3-year-olds; currently expecting to serve 135–140.
 - **9 classrooms for 3-year-olds** out of **16 total classrooms**; the rest are for 4-year-olds.

UPK Update

3. Community-Based Partnerships

- Previous partnerships (where community providers received payment via District 60) may be reconsidered in the **2026–27 school year**.
- Currently not likely for **2025–26**, but **referrals to community providers** will continue for families needing full-day care.

4. Funding Clarification

- If a child attends two programs (e.g., a district preschool and a private provider), **only one program can receive UPK funding**.
 - The second program must be funded through other means (e.g., CCCAP).

5. Provider Status & Next Steps

- The provider is close to becoming UPK eligible, pending licensing and fingerprinting.
- Once officially open, they can be added as a UPK provider.
- The goal is to **expand sites and capacity**, though financial sustainability (especially with Head Start challenges) remains a concern.

6. IEP & Special Education

- Children with IEPs typically receive services through the **school district**.
- Some families opt for **private providers**; in which case the district ensures providers meet the necessary qualifications to deliver services.

Angie Shehorn-Children First

CCCAP Funding Freeze

- Ongoing concern about the CCCAP (Colorado Child Care Assistance Program) funding freeze.
- Providers are unsure about the **long-term impact on business stability**.
- No new updates at this time.
- If no changes occur, the state is projected to be millions in deficit by FY 2027.

Training **Needs**

- Providers are expressing a strong preference for in-person trainings.
- They're **burned out on virtual/online formats**.
- Agencies that can help offer **in-person training** are encouraged to **partner**—contact Joe or the speaker to schedule sessions.

Angie Shehorn-Children First

Senate Bill 004 - Waitlist Fee Bill

- Originally driven by **local efforts in Pueblo**.
- Signed by the Governor.
- Final version is **much lighter** than the original proposal.
- Still worth reviewing for those interested in its impact.

Early Childhood Leadership Commission (ECLC)

- Was scheduled to **sunset**, but legislation has **renewed it**.
- ECLC will continue its work, which is a positive development for early childhood systems.

House Bill 1296 - Tax Expenditure Adjustments

- A large, complex bill involving **multiple tax expenditures**.
- Colorado Child Care Contribution Tax Credit has been removed from this bill.
- If the bill passes, expect **significant changes** to tax credits and deductions.

Legislation Senate Bill 197 – Tony Grampsas Youth Services (TGYS)

- Aims to **modernize and improve** the TGYS grant program.
- Has passed the Health & Human Services Committee and moves forward.

Senate Bill 200 - Dyslexia Screening & READ Act

- Initially proposed to replace Kindergarten Readiness Assessments.
- Amended to now include both assessments: Kindergarten Readiness and dyslexia screening.
- Dyslexia screening is not currently funded.

The Long Bill (State Budget)

- Passed both legislative chambers.
- Returned to the Joint Budget Committee (JBC) for amendments.
- Will return to chambers for **final approval**.
